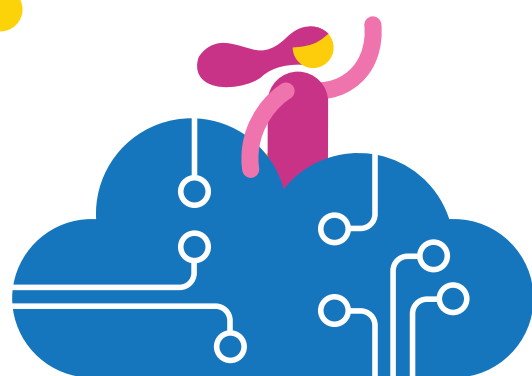


DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION IN THE EUROPEAN YOUTH FIELD:

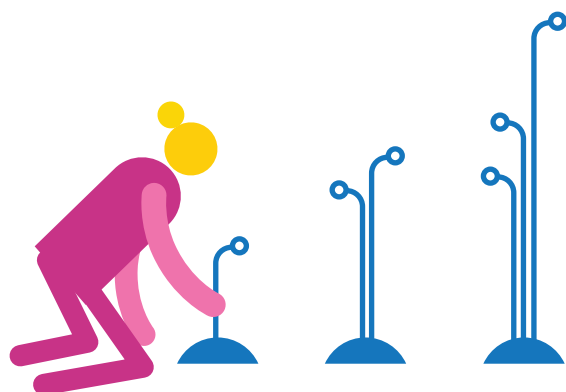
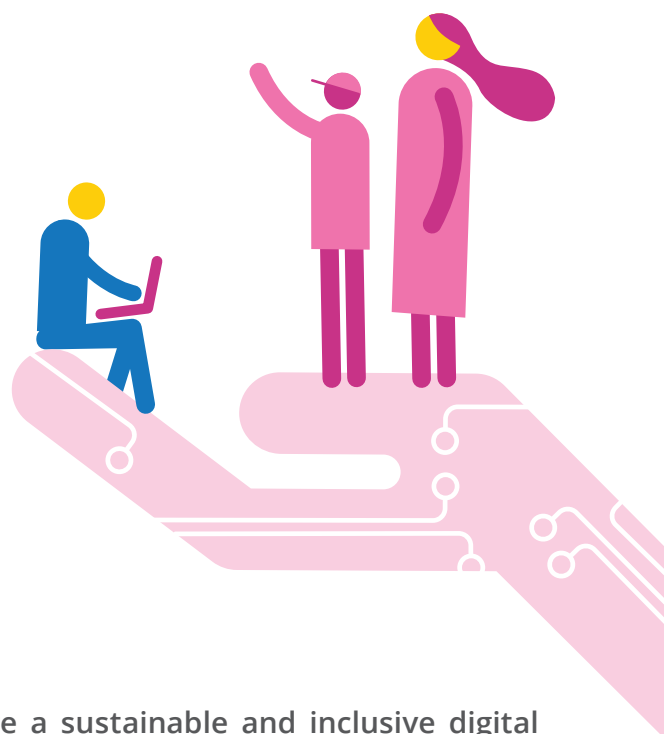


- › In the European youth field, digital transformation is understood as a multi-stakeholder and inclusive process encompassing the co-design, implementation and utilisation of people-centred digital technologies with and by young people, youth workers and other relevant stakeholders.

Digital transformation changes the way most areas of the youth field operate. Digital transformation describes the evolving integration of digital technologies into social, economic, and cultural processes and structures.

- › Young people, youth workers and other relevant stakeholders require appropriate support (e.g., digital literacy education) in order to participate, benefit from and contribute to digital transformation in Europe.

Digital transformation refers to both the practical changes in organisational functioning as well as society's evolving cultural and social norms.



- › To ensure a sustainable and inclusive digital transformation of the youth field in Europe, we propose the following areas of considerations.

MULTISTAKEHOLDERISM AND PARTICIPATION

DIGITAL EDUCATION

In order to respond to the challenges and opportunities related to digital transformation, stakeholders require skills such as critical digital literacy, media literacy, data and AI literacy, and many more. Digital transformation also requires an agile mindset, whereby education is seen as a responsive and adaptable process of life-long learning.

ACCESS AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Reliable internet access and efficient digital infrastructure are crucial in the European youth sector to provide equal opportunities to all.

STRATEGY

Digital transformation is an evolutionary process that requires a strategic and collaborative approach.

INNOVATION

Digital transformation offers opportunities to co-create innovative solutions in the European youth sector.

DIGITAL SUSTAINABILITY

Any digital transformational process should be assessed on its potential environmental impact. In the context of digital transformation, sustainability refers to developing and deploying technology in a secure, transparent, responsible and robust way.

DIGITAL RIGHTS AND ETHICS

Any European wide digital transformation processes should be grounded in human rights and European values.

DIGITAL WELL-BEING

During any digital transformation process the ongoing impact of digital technologies and digital processes on the mental, physical and emotional health of people should be considered.
